## **Equestrian Therapy: An Unempirical Alternative Treatment for Post-Katrina Stress Syndrome** By Beverly Stubblefield

There's a new facility in town that few people know about—the Equestrian Therapy Center of Slidell, owned and operated by Beverly Stubblefield, Ph. D., Clinical Psychologist. Using horses for therapy originated in Germany and England in the early 1970's to promote the mental and physical well being of clients through recreational riding.

Therapeutic riding typically includes the riding and care of the horse and its beneficial effects on the client. This form of therapy is goal-oriented and has been shown to be effective in the treatment of a wide variety of emotional and behavioral disorders in children and Therapeutic riding is different from adults. hippotherapy, which refers to the use of movement of the horse as a treatment tool to address impairments, functional limitations, and disabilities in individuals with neuromuscular dysfunction. Most of the Equestrian Therapy Centers in the Western part of St. Tammany Parish address these needs. But the North American Riding for the Handicapped Association has a special division for the treatment of emotionally handicapped children, and this is the primary focus of the Equestrian Therapy Center of Slidell.

love the attention and treats they receive from their clients. The Center will be getting a third horse hopefully this fall, Awesome Imprints, a retired show horse, who himself has physical handicaps.

A typical session includes grooming, exercises on the ground and horse, and teamwork. Different tactics are employed depending on the needs of the client. The horse is the focal point while the therapist works as facilitator. Children especially are more willing to change inappropriate behavior if the horse acts as the disciplinarian instead of the facilitator barking instructions. It is quite fascinating to see what the horse provides. Each session is different and the equine therapist seems to know just what is needed.

Equestrian therapy fosters safe, professional, ethical and therapeutic equine activities through education, communication, training, and riding for people with mental and physical disabilities. So, if you are stressed, depressed, or phobic, come see JR or Slick Smoothy Scotch for a session. Just call 985-643-5145 to schedule an appointment.

Although Katrina has hindered the development of the Slidell Center, clients currently experience alternative an treatment to post-Katrina stress syndrome through the equine therapist. Children and adults alike can develop trust, improve self-confidence, and boost selfesteem. This form of treatment has been found to be very helpful to individuals traumatized by the hurricane and its aftermath.

The Center presently has two equine therapists, JR Smoothy Scotch and his younger brother Slick Smoothy Scotch. Both are registered quarter horse geldings with easy-going, laid-back dispositions. Both horses really

## **Caribe Party Cruise**

Mandeville Harbor has always been a favorite destination for TYC sailors, whether enjoying the waterfront restaurants or hanging out at Pontchartrain Yacht Club. The added incentives of PYC's Caribe Party in their new, temporary club and a refurbished public dock made a Mandeville cruise too inviting to pass up. So despite the thunderstorms, light winds and 90 degree temperatures, we set out for the party with a full crew aboard WINDSOME.

The trip over was comfortable under the bimini and dodger. Our radar let us avoid the heavier showers and monitor the movement of a waterspout off Lakefront Airport. (It was moving away from us, but folks paid attention when I explained where life preservers were stored.) At Goose Point, the sky cleared and we had enough wind to complete the trip into Mandeville Harbor under full sail with Bill Yauger and Ann Sheppard taking turns at the helm while Steve Jones trimmed sails and tried to talk us into putting the centerboard down (Go faster, less leeway!). Dodie, Jim Ivey, Etchie Yauger, Susan and I tasted the wine and just enjoyed the good company.

Although there were 32 TYC folks at the PYC party, most opted for land cruising rather than facing the weather. Either way, the trip was great fun. PYC is back in full swing with good food, good music, a responsive bar and great hospitality. Everyone had a wonderful time, and for those of us who partied too much, the Broken Egg Café was an easy walk for a Sunday brunch complete with great coffee!

Most of you have done more post-Katrina boating than we have, but if you are new to the area or are just now returning to the lake, there are a few areas that deserve vour attention. Onboard WINDSOME, we have been reluctant to put our centerboard down in fear of running into someone's house that was moved into Lake Pontchartrain. The good news is that on our trip to PYC, we found nothing unusual on our depth sounder and didn't see any drifting debris. We are looking forward to more sailing, with the following reminders in our log.



Going out of Oak Harbor, the red and green channel markers were down, but the pilings are still in place. Finding your way home after dark or in foul weather could be a challenge, so save your GPS track. In the channel the most shoal depth was a little over 8', but we did not explore the full width of the channel.

Once out of the Oak Harbor channel, there were several metal poles marking a channel to the I-10 bridge. Prior to the cruise, we "slalomed" WINDSOME between the poles. Water depths were 9' or greater and we found no evidence of subsurface debris. I assume that the poles once marked a clear channel for larger vessels doing salvage operations in the harbor. The poles did register on our radar's short range scale, but you had to know where to look. Hitting a pole with a folding prop could be expensive, so again save your GPS track if you plan to return to Oak Harbor after dark.

On our way home from PYC we briefly looked for the old pipeline markers between Lacombe and Bayou Liberty. We didn't see the markers, but a metal pole with reflective tape was where one of the markers should have been. We'd recommend staying clear of the old pipeline marker locations... no telling what's down there.

Finally, Mandeville Harbor is clearly marked and easy to enter. The harbor has been cleared of debris and the bulkheads have been repaired to better-than-ever condition. Outlets for shore power should be working soon. Since most boating folks are still dealing with Katrina issues, there are few boats cruising Lake Pontchartrain, and we had the entire harbor all to ourselves. For those of you who can break away from Katrina repairs, Mandeville is a wonderful destination!

So...let's go cruising again! We visited Gulfport Yacht Club (by car) last weekend. They have a temporary club that includes a pool (all that remained after Katrina), a great bar, and wonderful hospitality. Their guest dock was in good repair. Keep October 21 open on your calendar and we will let you know our cruising plans via email. The likely destinations are either GYC or Ship Island. Better yet, give us a call if you're interested in a cruise, or if you have another destination on your horizon.
