All classes come back with stories of the battle – some good some not so good! Work before play, each sailor has their duty and order of storage. The boats are de-rigged and stowed for the night. Next comes playing in the pool for fun and relaxation. The rest of the day includes showers, dinner, a movie or ice cream, and hotel sleeping. "Moments" later the alarm clock rings for day 2 of the same course.

At the end of all the races the juniors and parent gather for the awards. This is a typical ceremony of success where the proud are recognized and others think about what they need to do better next time. However some are not so typical and maybe really make you think about the traditions that precede this sport. The winning trophy this day was presented by an elderly lady on behave of her father, the trophies name sake. With stories of sailing in the 1930's and how this "Gentleman among men" grew to love the sport and founded this series with the hope that juniors continue the sailing with honor.

It is three hours back home for unpacking, getting ready for school and some needed rest. Until the next weekend when it is off to Pensacola.

I hope to think that this will be a wonderful memory of an adult looking back on their childhood and maybe saying to their children, "when I was your age....."
