All of the competitors finished within an hour of the first boat to cross the line which is one of the tightest finishes I've seen in the race for a while.

Congratulations go to Kokopelli for winning the Spinnaker Division and Orion for winning the Non-Spinnaker Division.

LPRC Race Recap

I'm going to start off with saying that this was one heck of a weekend for Tammany Yacht Club. Tammany hosted the first part of the regatta starting with a skippers meeting on Thursday night. Racing started on Friday with the first race scheduled at noon. When the boats arrived on the race course, the breeze was so light, that nobody thought they would be able to start a race. By the time 12pm rolled around, the breeze had freshened to 10-11 knots. All during the first upwind leg, the wind gained strength and boats had to switch to smaller head sails for the second lap. By the finish of the first race, the winds were at a sustained 18-20 knots with gusts reach 26 as the front rolled in. Because of the wind and waves, the second race was abandoned and the boats sent back to TYC.

Friday afternoon and evening the sailors were treated to our great hospitality. As soon as results were finished, The SoulaBillySwampBoogie Band got started and kept everyone's toes a-tappin' for the next 4 hours. All the while, videos of the mark rounding's and the race tracking were being shown on the televisions. There was a lot of good feedback and many people were saying they had never spent this much time at TYC and it was a great party. I would like to personally extend a huge thank you to everyone that helped out.

Saturday morning brought the distance race, more breeze and bigger waves. By the start of the distance race at 10am, everyone had already switched down to their smallest headsail and put on their PFDs. The race started near the Bayou Liberty #2 and most had reached the south hump in the Causeway in a little over 2 hours. The race was mostly downwind in a sustained 20 kts plus of breeze and big, following seas. Surfing the name of the game and I think every TYC boat hit double digits on the waves. There were plenty of wipeouts and a number of destroyed spinnakers.

On Sunday, the breeze decided to lay down a little and allowed the race committee to get three races off without too much drama. Kokopelli was sailing like clockwork, putting three first places in the books and taking Boat of the Day. After racing, the sailors returned to NOYC for awards where Wildcard took third overall in the series and Kokopelli, in addition to Boat of the Day, took first in their class and also Boat of the Regatta! Congratulations to Kyle Bowser and crew for a well-sailed regatta and bring home the Red Jacket to TYC!

The traditional Knot and Shot Competition was held at the LPRC party this past Friday evening. There were thirteen participants and the competition was fierce.

Winning the Knot and Shot competition involves drinking a shot of rum, tying a bowline knot in a line, lassoing a makeshift piling on a platform from a certain distance, pulling the piling and platform to you, grabbing a beer that has been placed in a coosie on the platform, chug-a-lugging the beer, and then placing the empty beer bottle upside down on top of your head to signify that it is empty. It is both a competition and a spectator sport with onlookers cheering on their favorite contestants.

VIEW FROM THE BACK OF THE SINGLE-HANDED FLEET Bill Jobst

On Friday morning, forecast winds for Saturday's single-handed race were still at 25 knots out of the east. It was time to either prepare to race in high winds or decide to watch the LSU football game. Since I've only missed a few of Tammany's single-handed races, I decided to toughen up and begin race preparation. Changing to my cruising headsail requires a bit of physical effort, but with wind dockside at a paltry 15 knots, my huffing and puffing during the sail change lasted only for an hour. Next came the staysail packing. Because of the forecast winds, rubber bands and matchsticks (one of the most important things I learned in college) were used to keep the staysail bundled during the hoist.

The wind doesn't read weather forecasts, and at the starting line on Saturday morning, the wind was from the NNE rather than east. That was great news! I immediately cancelled plans to start with my spinnaker pole and staysail ready for downwind sailing. Things were looking good for this aged sailor since the race now appeared to be a broad reach under main and jib from Bayou Liberty to the Causeway, another broad reach along the Causeway, and finally a beat back home. All I would need to do was reef the main for the second and third legs of the race. (I should mention that there were only a handful of entrants at the start. Presumably most sailors appreciated the "sportiness" of sailing in 25 knot winds and chose to watch the LSU game.).

Things were comfortable until a few minutes after the start when the wind clocked to the east, as forecast, allowing ORION to put up her monster whisker pole. Since I can barely match ORION's speed, even with my staysail, I hove to for some major sail realignment. Several years ago my crew said that I was not allowed forward of the steering wheel, so my foredeck skills proved to be a bit rusty. By the time I got the staysail up and the cruising jib out on a pole, the fleet was a group of white dots about two miles ahead. But now I was SURFIN'! I had time between waves to think about how I was going to untangle the foredeck mess that I had just created. I couldn't think of an easy solution.

I had gained considerably by the time we reached the Causeway mark, but was still tail-end-Charlie. I decided to reach south along the Causeway with the jib out on starboard and still on the pole. I let the staysail sheet run free so that it could blow to starboard along the jib. I crawled forward between waves and stowed the staysail down the forward hatch without incident. My only thought was that the waves breaking over the bow were warm, so if I fell overboard and had to wait several hours, the swim (with lifejacket) might be enjoyable. Now it was time to get the spinnaker pole down.

Usually getting the pole down is a simple matter of pulling the release for the jib sheet, swinging the pole forward, up over the bow pulpit, and down into its resting place on deck. Unfortunately I couldn't get the jib sheet to release from the pole. After multiple tries, I clawed my way back to the cockpit to reflect on this new problem.

After some head scratching, I realized that I had been pulling on the wrong release wire. So forward I went again, this time dropping the outboard end of the pole into the water because I failed to reset the topping lift rope clutch on my previous effort. With a boat speed over 6 knots, lifting the pole out of the water was impossible without mechanical help. Fortunately, I was able to get the topping lift around my winch, winch the pole out of the water and swing it forward. But now I had a new problem. Because of the wind force on the jib foot, I couldn't lift the pole under the jib and over the bowsprit without crawling forward to the bow, lying on my back and lifting the outer end of the pole up and over by hand...all between waves. Now back to the cockpit to rest a bit before putting in the double reef.

WINDSOME is a centerboard boat, and despite a 7' 9" draft, she likes to heel unless the mainsail area is reduced... we are talking 35 degrees of heel. The reefing process requires that the mainsail luff for a few seconds while the reef is put in. Without crew the "few seconds" was more than enough time for the boat to head up, tack, and sail hove to with the jib back-winded. If you haven't tried it, sailing hove to is comfortable, but forward progress is near zero, and it's not a way to win a race, especially with the boat pointed back toward Mandeville. It does, however, make the reefing process easier.

Well, after a jibe to get back heading south, the fleet was several miles ahead and the mantra was "live to fight another day." The beat from the Causeway back to Bayou Liberty was wet and uneventful, except for the point where apparent wind dropped from 26 knots to 17 knots. I clearly needed more mainsail power, so out came the reef. I got back to the cockpit just in time to see the wind speed kick back to 25 knots. I didn't feel much like more foredeck activity, so I cruised home "on my ear" making more sideways progress than windward progress.

The single-handed race leaves most skippers saying "never again". But time heals bruises, damaged equipment is repaired and bad memories are softened. Perhaps I'll feel better when the next single-handed race day comes...especially if there is a trophy for racers over age 65.

Congratulations to my competitors who probably had less excitement than I did. Also the race committee, Gary Knight and Kevin Blank, did their usual superb job while bumping up and down for 8 hours and watching us racers "have fun".



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
