


It's still crazy. States that have significantly eased Covid-19 restrictions have seen a major increase in the number of reported cases. No doubt, some of this is due to the increased number of individuals tested, but not all. The good news, if there is any, is that the fatality rate of infected individuals seems to be lower. Depending on where you get your news, this "fact" may be disputed. What IS true is that the pandemic is still here, and we are all at risk. Masks (to protect others), social distancing, hand washing, sanitizing surfaces and reducing personal contact in general will reduce the likelihood of contracting the disease. Most of the TYC population is also classified as being in a high risk group for more severe consequences if the disease is contracted. Be smart.

With all of the above in mind, the Club is open on a reduced schedule. Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday with our normal hours. Check the TYC Calendar on the web for the latest information. We are trying to keep the information posted current and accurate.

Some of you may have seen the plethora of small sailboats in the lagoon. Sail Camp is in full swing, but strict Covid-19 protocols are being followed. We have to be diligent. 

I have hopes that the Junior Team will be able to participate in a regatta this summer. With the uncertainty due to Covid restrictions, Capdeville races have been put on hold.


Sail camp has also brought us new members. Olivia Huerstal (junior) and Steve and Laura McKinney who came to watch their grandson and grand nephews in Session 1.



Hank the Corgi, has adopted our sail camp. He joins the kids in the afternoon for their swim time.







I bought Egret from Luis in 1982 and enjoyed sailing her for 33 years. We sailed her extensively in the Northeast and sold it recently to a fellow in Haverstraw NY. We were saddened to hear of his passing and we thought of Luis often especially when we sailed Egret in heavy weather. Egret provided many years of enjoyment for my family and protected us in all kinds of weather.

I stayed in touch with Luis occasionally to let him know how Egret was as we meticulously maintained her. Last time we chatted over email he was captaining a ship between the Azores and Norfolk.

Please send my sympathy to Luis's wife and let her know Egret is still sailing up here in the New York area.

A life well lived!

To those who knew Captain Luis Tonizzo it saddens me to tell you that Saturday (4/20/19) I received information that he passed away from a heart attack on Good Friday. Luis was a founding member of TYC. He put Tammany Yacht Club on the world sailing map by competing in the 1980 OSTAR (Observer Single Handed Transatlantic Race) and later in the 1984 OSTAR where he won Class IV. Slidell attorney Jim Bates, also a TYC member competed in the 1984 OSTAR and placed third in Class IV.

Luis, a professional ship's Captain, sailed his Dufour 27 named Egret from Slidell to Newport, RI to Plymouth, England to qualify as a competitor in the 1980 OSTAR from England back to Newport. The shortest great circle route if attainable is 2810 nautical miles. He finished in 33 days, 5 hours and 25 minutes, placing seventh in Class J. He received numerous accolades for his successful finish including a proclamation from the Louisiana Secretary of the Senate representing the Governor.

TYC did not yet have a bona fide club house so the presentation was made from the bed of a pickup truck on the side of Liberty Marine by then founding Commodore Guy Geller. During his acceptance speech Luis Tonizzo vowed he would build a 35 foot boat, compete in 1984 and win Class IV. He did both; winning his class in 20 days, 23 hours 40 minutes! Jim Bates finished 3rd in 22 days, 18 hours and 9 minutes aboard Big Shot, a modified J35. TYC, the upstart little yacht club on the Bayou did very well among world class single handed sailors in boats of up to 56 feet. Luis was credited with the shortest route traveled of the 91 boats that started the race.

Luis Tonizzo was born in Argentina, attended the U. S. Merchant Marine Academy in KingsPointe, NY. He was the Navigator on numerous ships traveling the world while honing his skills. When not aboard ships, he lived in Slidell with his parents until he and Guy Geller (Rusty) managed to pay for an apartment on Bayou Bonfouca until Rusty married his high school sweetheart. Luis traveled all of the oceans on Merchant Ships and rose to the rank and responsibility of Ship's Captain. He and his wife Jeanne owned and operated the SilkRoad Trading Company, Inc. on Front Street specializing in Oriental rugs and memorabilia. They moved to Maine a number of years ago where Jeanne still resides. While there Luis suffered a number of health problems which he defeated to return to the sea which he loved.

His demise came about as he was docking a ship during a tremendous storm; the successful docking completed he suffered a heart attack and died at the age of 72. Those who knew him will miss him: those who did not know him would have had a more complete life if they had.

TAMMANY YACHT CLUB, A Bit of Our Past

REMEMBRANCES of Guy Geller

Several years have passed since a historical recap of Tammany Yacht Club has been presented. Commodore Jeff Hebert asked me to synopsize nineteen years in one thousand words or less.

I quote from the "The History of the Southern Yacht Club" by Flora K. Sheib, Chapter 25: *Yacht Clubs of Louisiana*. "The Tammany Yacht Club is located on the north shore of beautiful Lake Pontchartrain in Slidell, Louisiana. It was granted a charter on July 25, 1980. Within a year this fledgling had been welcomed into the Gulf Yachting Association and had moved into a quaint bungalow near the banks of meandering Bayou Liberty.

The first Commodore, Guy C. Geller was aided in this initial endeavor by Charles J. Fleming, Vice Commodore; H. G. Hagoort, Rear Commodore; Harry B. Grant, Secretary; and Ronald Vaughan, Treasurer. Board Members were Edwin Randle, Roland Decrevel, and David Barnes."

A trio of businesses: Liberty Marine, Inc., a boat sales/marine store and boatyard owned by Chuck Fleming, Liberty Marina (100+ boats) and Bonfouca Marina (250+ boats) were at the heart of a thriving boating community in the mid to late seventies, early eighties. Chuck was an ardent racing sailor who employed Pat Geller as store manager/girl Friday for a number of years. At the time, he and I were probably the only racing boat owners in the marina. Our club affiliation and competition was through our memberships with the New Orleans Yacht Club.

For me, racing entailed coming home from New Orleans on Friday, going to the boat, sailing back to New Orleans, spending the night on the boat, racing Saturday and Sunday and sailing the nine-teen miles back on Sunday after the race. This went on three times a month from 1975 on. During that period an abortive attempt had been made to form a *Bayou Liberty Cruising Club*.

Chuck and I spent many hours and several bottles of rum evaluating the possibilities of forming a "Yacht Club" that would successfully overcome the problems of the ill-fated *BLCC*. We decided that we should propose a "family oriented" organization to interested boaters using their love of the water as the common denominator. Cruising, racing, fishing, small boats, big boats, and even professions would be secondary, if even considered. We discussed our thoughts with representatives of each interest. Harold and Jan Pecunia and Dave Barnes were sought out often for input and advice for their "power" expertise.

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Ultimately, we arrived at the decision that 350 boat owners should be given the opportunity to express their desire, whether or not to participate. Chuck agreed to place a sign-up sheet on his counter in early February. Pat was to be the recruiter and would explain the concept. The signature was free. Very soon over one hundred twenty-five names had been recorded. We made arrangements to use the St. Genevieve hall for an evening meeting. I don't recall exactly, but I think that probably fifty to sixty people attended.

The plan was to discuss whether or not to expend any more time and energy on this project. If we did, where would the funds come from to continue? The proposal was made that in order to reserve a membership, one would write a fifty dollar non-refundable check. If the club was formed, the fifty dollars would be applied to initiation fees. The response was very favorable in the form of checks.

We sought advice from local attorney Gus Fritchie who was involved with the formation of Pinewood Country Club. He agreed to advise and incorporate us "pro bono" providing we did the work. We went about the business of writing articles of incorporation and by-laws. Chuck allowed Pat to type and retype during her workday at Liberty Marine. We tried for "non-profit status"; the club couldn't qualify so we ended up as a "not-for-profit". Part of this procedure required that we designate a board of directors.

We asked a number of potential members. It was not easy to find people that would commit a good portion of their free time. We ended up with eight people as the first board of TYC. A board meeting was held in Gus Fritchie's office with him presiding. Gus had been asked to participate as a board member but declined. The first order of business was to hold an election to determine the officers. The results were recorded in Flo Scheib's quotation. We then reviewed the articles, made the necessary changes and finally we produced documents that were acceptable for submission to the state.

The "Tammany Yacht Club" was officially chartered on July 25, 1980. On occasion I have been asked why the "St." was omitted. Primarily, because a "St. Tammany Yacht Club" was formed in Mandeville in the 1930s. During my abortive research I was unable to unearth any significant facts other than its existence was pretty short-lived.

REMEMBRANCES of Guy Geller

Part 3

Establishing tradition is generally not a planned process. However, at the time, we felt that certain social events should repeat annually. Valentine's Day dinner and dance; Mother's Day breakfast, consisting of mimosas and Eggs Benedict was cooked and served by the dads, before the Mother's Day Regatta. Mom had to skipper the family boat but Dad had to sail on another boat. The Fourth of July picnic with traditional family competition for the juniors. Charter Day was one of three formal celebrations that included a formal flag raising, with invitations to the local political representatives. The formal event was followed by a race and a dinner. The Commodore's cocktail party, I had a hard time calling it a "ball" since the floor still had shag carpeting. The Children's Christmas party, and the third formal event, the New Year's Eve party.

The annual "luau" with an all night pig roasting in a pit party eventually turned into a "shipwreck party". The volunteers got tired of stuffing a thousand won tons at Etchie Yauger's house, and lighting those "cute" little candles in paper sacks. Still, the volcano rice and the rum filled watermelon basket, floating in the pool added a certain flair to the event.

Potluck dinners were pretty big in the beginning. Under the TYC chefs' auspices a cooking competition was developed. There were I believe five categories, from appetizers to desserts. The competition lasted five weeks each time. The diners were given score sheets with a vote for each category. The food was great.

Mike Newell began a series of monthly theme dinners, from décor and costumes to after dinner drinks. Mexican, Italian, Chinese etc. Great fun and again great food! Shrimp boils and Doug Wilson's fish fries were professionally executed. Bobby Boos' alligator sauce piquant and Sean Hickey's fried turkeys all added variety to our social calendar.

Cruising became a very important part of club activities; there were dinner cruises to the south shore and to the coast. There were annual Mardi Gras cruises to Madisonville to watch the boat parade. Somewhere I have a photo of Bill Cunningham rowing his dinghy, ferrying Carol Jeffery in her mink. There was even a ten-boat week-long cruise to Pensacola.

Ten cruises a year were established to compete for the Ken and Dorie Kinsey Cruising Trophy. They donated the ship's wheel that you see on the wall before we even had a clubhouse. They were coming from Texas going back to Rhode Island or North Carolina I don't remember which. They pulled into Bayou Liberty during a TYC hamburger/hot dogs cook out in the back of Liberty Marine. The two of them tried to dock their Islander 41 with a fourteen-foot beam with a cross wind. A few of the crowd went to help them tie up and get situated, pulled them off their boat and brought them over for complementary food and drinks. They were invited to our homes for showers, dinners, taken shopping etc. Before their departure they handed me fifty dollars to apply toward a cruising trophy.

The two "signature" special events of TYC had been a success, so in 1983 we began looking for a new type of regatta. We wanted to include the four GYA lake clubs. We talked about anchoring a large barge in the middle of the lake. Each club would have a feeder race to the barge on Saturday. Sunday, all boats would participate in either an Olympic Triangle or steeplechase. Several other formats were discussed. Finally we decided that a three weekend round robin from club to club should be discussed with race committees of NOYC, PYC, and SYC. It could be called the "Lake Pontchartrain Racing Circuit." We evaluated our facility and decided that logistically it was too early in the club's existence to attempt the sponsorship of such an auspicious event. The plans were tabled, to be brought off the table six months hence. One of our members who participated in the planning had lunch with his attorney, a senior member of the Board of SYC.

A short time later we received an invitation to participate in the planning of the Tulis Cup. A "great new regatta" with an innovative format. It would take three weeks and include all four clubs. After several meetings and for reasons best left unsaid the Tulis Cup suffered a short and somewhat painful demise. In late 1984, then Commodore Arreteig appointed me the representative of TYC to the Executive Committee for the formation of the Lake Pontchartrain Racing Circuit. PC Cleve Fair of Pontchartrain YC, PC Tom Trenchard of NOYC, and Jack Dane of SYC were the appointees of their clubs. Jim Bates, Sean Hickey, and Tim Iwanczyk were the TYC Regatta Committee members. The first race of the circuit was scheduled to be sailed on Saturday Nov. 2nd, 1985. The last of a Hurricane came through and we had to cancel that race, but started the next day. The balance of the regatta was an overwhelming success as have all since.

Tim Iwanczyk designed the official logo that is still in use, and Barbara Skremetta designed and printed the first official poster.

The oil bust decimated two marinas, sending members in search of jobs elsewhere. Membership having grown to somewhat over one hundred was now down to mid sixties.

In late 1987 the nominating committee asked me to run for Commodore again. I acceded with the understanding that I would accelerate the search for a new club site. During the last few months as Commodore, Bob Boos had discussed this concern with the dwindling membership, feeling that a new club would be an incentive for new members and rejuvenation for the old members.



A few members had moved their boats to then Eden Isles Marina. Harold Pecunia was among the first to lease a slip there. After my election, he agreed to continue chairing the relocation committee. It really was not an easy decision. Many members felt that we should remain where we were. With the good of the Club in mind we proceeded. Eden Isles was not the only location considered but construction was still pretty positive there. Harold and Jan flew to California in June of 1988 to discuss possibilities with Frank Warren and his staff. My term ended in January 1989 and Nigel Beale picked up the baton or gavel and continued in the same direction. Planning and negotiations continued. Ray Evarts, the harbormaster, and Harold met endless hours to secure a suitable and affordable lease.

Many of you worked long hours to prepare for the first Friday night dinner on September 14, 1990. The dedication on October 21st under the direction of Commodore Bill Watson and his Board of Directors was memorable and a preamble to the November 2nd LPRC party.

Please allow me a few lines for a personal statement of appreciation. During the sixteen years of almost daily involvement, fourteen of which were on the board of directors in various offices and in over thirty committee chairmanships, I have enjoyed a cooperation from all who participated, beyond any level of expectation. I owe; we owe a debt of gratitude to the people before you without whom this organization would not have prospered. Now, I appreciate our Commodore, Board of Directors, committee chairs and above all the membership, your support of this club.

I am not a painter, nor am I a composer so I leave no artistic legacy. Tammany Yacht Club as my shared, public legacy hopefully will live on. Please conserve it, serve it well when you are asked, and above all don't get caught up in the petty foibles that undermine the existence of any organization.

I really can't count the number of people I must thank and I will make no attempt to name them. However, one person stands out time and time again over the years; my critic, very seldom; my supporter, always; my partner, my wife Pat. Thank you, your patience knows no bounds!

This chapter of our lives has come to an end and a new one has begun. Our dual residence makes it difficult to participate at the same level that we were accustomed. We will visit from time to time.

I raise my glass in toast: To old Friends, and to new!

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
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
