



Another chapter in "the TYC members you should have known."

Past Commodore Bobby Boos was commodore in 1986/1987. Toward the end of his term, it was time for nomination for the next year's slate of officers. No one stepped forward to have his or her name placed on the ballot; citing the fear that the club was not going to survive another year and didn't want to be blamed for its demise. I had always been a perennial optimist, so Bobby all but coerced me into taking the position. My terms to Commodore Boos were simple, that I would work diligently toward moving the club to Eden Isle Marina even though it was not a popular decision. I already had plans in that direction, so when he accepted those terms, I agreed. I realized that this would not be a titular position but an actual working job with the goal of getting the nay-sayers to be won over to vote for the move. Election night came and as the only candidate for commodore, I was sworn in by acclamation with many wishes for good luck.

Commodore Boos had been a favored member of the club even to those he and his wife Anna or Anna-B as I called her, beat during the many sailing races. Bobby and Anna aboard their red Cal-25 *Country Mama* were terrors on the lake, winning frequently and beating larger boats. Occasionally, someone else took the winner's cannon. Bobby was a very talented maker of dental caps and false teeth. I know of three custom caps that he made for members. Sarah Lee Newell had a dollar sign, Janice Cunningham had a lightning bolt, and I had a TYC burgee, all embossed in white gold. My dentist said that he had never seen such fine work.

Bobby had been constantly involved in the welfare and the betterment of the Tammany Yacht Club. During those early days there was not a lot of excess money floating around so members took turns furnishing food for the Friday night dinner. Mike Newell

came up with the idea that we should do themed meals. One week was Italian, another Mexican another Hawaiian etcetera; depending on the members' preferred specialty. Bobby was famous for his alligator sauce piquant. Even those who were apprehensive about eating tails of alligators, were won over by his mystical spice recipes. It did not taste like chicken!

We were the host club, for the first Pontchartrain Racing Circuit final party and there was no way that we could accommodate all the finishing crews and families in our facility. The local Coca Cola distributor furnished a huge tent for us to use. The evening turned out to be a resounding success, after every member had pitched in to do so. My wife had enlisted a half-dozen nursing students from my daughter's class at Charity Hospital to solicit and deliver drinks. If they didn't make it as nurses, they could have converted to Hooter's restaurants waitresses. (I know, now they are called servers!) A great time was had by all!

Harold Pecunia and Jan had already moved the *Happy Days* to Eden Isles and heaped praises on the facility. The floating docks and easy parking made it a good selling point. Bobby and I met again, and we agreed that I would ask Harold to serve as the head of the transitioning committee which he accepted and did with a lot of hard work using his negotiating skill. He and Jan flew to California, at their own expense, to meet with Frank Warren, the owner of the marina to negotiate a suitable club, which they did very successfully.

Bobby and Anna Boos eventually tired of winning, if there is such a time; bought a farm in Mississippi and named it the *Bob Farm*. So, the Red Cal-25, *Country Mama* was exchanged for a red International tractor. They hosted annual parties at the Bob Farm.

Sadly, Bobby suffered a terminal heart attack on August 17, 2016, and joined the ranks of the numerous Past Commodores who are no longer with us. He and they, were staunch contributors to the success of the Tammany Yacht Club that according to sages of some from our neighboring clubs; would not last six months. That was 42 years ago.





FROM THE BAR

From the Bar

It has been more than 50 years since Neil Armstrong descended from Apollo 11's lunar landing craft, Eagle, and spoke the words that appear in our history books "....one small step for man; one giant leap for mankind." While Apollo 11 was, and is, considered a technological marvel, it is far less complex than NASA's Mars project. NASA's goal is to develop (1) a new rocket-based Space Launch System, (2) a reusable crew module, ORION, (3) a moonorbiting space station, GATEWAY, and (4) a spacecraft to descend and land ORION on Mars and return it to orbit. The project involves millions of components, each of which must function perfectly. Audrey Lander is one of Lockheed Martin's engineers working to make NASA's goal possible.

Audrey was born in Ohio. At age 7, her family moved to South Deerfield, MA, to allow her father to finish his Ph.D. at Amherst. When her father completed his degree and accepted a position at NASA's Earth Research Laboratory, her family moved to Picayune, MS, as far away as practical from the Gulf Coast and the devastation caused by Hurricane Camille. Audrey was 10 when she transferred to grade school in Picayune and coasted thru with an A- average. After grade school, Audrey entered high school in Picayune where she focused on math and chemistry, with French and Latin as secondary interests. She was a member of the swim team, played trumpet/baritone and, despite being only 4'10" tall, played tuba in the marching band. (No photos available.)

Following her interest in science, Audrey continued her education at Mississippi University for Women. She was selected for a Naval Research Laboratory cooperative education (Co-Op) program, working under the direction of Dr. Brenda Little, the Navy's senior scientist for corrosion processes. She joined Martin Marietta after college and applied her knowledge of chemistry and physics to the assembly of the Space Shuttle's External Tank. She met her future husband, David Lander, on a van pool to the Michoud Assembly Facility.

With four growing children, Audrey decided that a career change was in order. She chose teaching because it allowed her to be on the same schedule as her children. Audrey taught 4th grade for seven years, then physics for eight years. After fifteen years of teaching, Lockheed Martin convinced her to join their team, and she began her present career as Senior Staff Materials Engineer with responsibility for corrosion control of the ORION crew module. While many commercial vehicles have traveled to the International Space Station at 250 miles away, Orion will be one of the first vehicles in many years to travel to the moon at 250,000 miles away. The module is currently preparing for an August 23, 26-day lunar mission with recovery in the Pacific Ocean. Audrey and her team will perform a corrosion inspection and data collection of the returned crew module in early 2023.


David and Audrey are enjoying learning to sail in their 35' Hallberg-Rassy ketch, VAILEA. Once Audrey retires, there may even be some extended cruising. Meanwhile, they look forward to short cruises in the area. If you're interested in forming a small cruising flotilla, just ask at the bar. You might also ask that Audrey be especially alert around ORION. Astronauts' lives and the success of a multinational space program depend on her work.


