



A Critical Nut

Most boaters would argue that all nuts are critical, but there is one particular nut that stands apart from the others, both in importance and simplicity. Our story begins on a beautiful sunny afternoon. Susan and I were taking possible newcomers on a boat tour of Eden Isles. We were near the end of a canal, about two miles from the Oak Harbor Basin, and we needed to turn around. Turning WINDSOME, our Tartan 37 CB, in a narrow canal is a multi-step process: turn sharply to starboard, shift into reverse, turn the wheel to port as the boat begins to move backward, apply power to kick the stern to port, then shift into forward gear to proceed back down the canal.

Well, half-way through our turn, we shifted into reverse and throttled to about 2000 rpm. That's when the gear shift and speed control failed. We were doing about 5 knots in reverse, and our options seemed limited. Turning a diesel off at 2000 rpm just doesn't work. Crashing into a bulkhead at 5 knots seemed certain to invite personal injury, extensive property damage, and lawsuits. Although I knew the location of the throttle and gear shift on the engine, no one else did, and getting into WINDSOME's engine compartment requires gymnastic ability. Shoreside spectators seemed to think that speeding in reverse was normal for us, so aside from a few cheerful waves, no shoreside help was forthcoming.

Our best choice seemed to be to continue motoring in reverse at 5 knots until we reached the marina basin where we could turn off the fuel valve (easily accessible by the chart table), let the engine die of fuel starvation, anchor, and hope for a tow. That's what we did, and it was successful! Our apology for any near-misses of bulkheads or boats.



So, what about that critical nut? The shifting and speed control cables are rigid stainless-steel wires inside an outer cover that is firmly attached to the boat. On WINDSOME the attachment point is about half way down the steering pedestal. Called a cap nut, it fastens the shifting and speed control cables to the boat, allowing the stainless-steel wires to slide inside the cables. The nut is visible on the outside of the steering pedestal. If it ever comes loose, you have a problem.

Since cables were assembled internal to the steering pedestal when the boat was built, I was expecting a major repair. Fortunately, a friend was able to use an 18-inch drill bit to coax the machine screw with cables back into the hole on the steering pedestal while I reattached our critical nut. Since nudging a small machine screw into a hole using a drill bit is mostly luck, we immediately purchased \$20 of lottery tickets knowing that we were certain to win. But we didn't win. Apparently, we had used our luck motoring two miles in reverse, anchoring and getting the critical nut back onto its home. Our \$20 did return \$7, enough to by thread sealer so this can't happen again.

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COOKIN' WITH TYC

Our June recipe is sent to us from Amythist Kearney. Amythist has shared her Four Bean Gumbo Recipe. Thanks, Amythist! Enjoy!

Four Bean Gumbo by Amythist Kearney

(Soak the beans in water at least a day in advance or until there is "bean scum". Drain and rinse well before use. Do not use salt or any seasoning at this point or the beans may stay hard.)

You can also prepare the roux part of this recipe the day before and refrigerate.

Ingredients: 1/2 pound each dry bean: kidney, black eye, and lentil 1 can Blue Runner Navy Beans (do not drain) 3 cans coconut milk (not the sweet kind) Savoy's Gluten Free Instant Roux (there is no measurement, need to eyeball this) 1 can 5 oz. chicken in water (do not drain but smash out the chunks) 1/2 lb. andouille sausage (cut about 1/4" thick) 1/2 lb. pulled pork (no bbg sauce) or just add enough uncooked Boston Butt Pork Roast to your liking 1 lb. salt pork 3 low sodium chicken bouillon cubes (crush in advance if needed) 2 tsp tomato paste 1 lb. of Guidry's Fresh Cuts Creole Seasoning (or finely chopped: 1 bell pepper, 2 onions, 3 stalks celery, 1/4 cup fresh parsley) 4tbsp. minced garlic

1/4 cup duck fat (substitute bacon fat or olive oil) 1tbsp.coriander 1tbsp.cumin 1/2 tsp crab boil (leave out if no heat is desired)

Tools: Large skillet or chicken fryer skillet Large slow cooker Slow cooker liner (optional) Several wood spoons for stirring Bowl or plate (to set aside the sausage) Large bowl (to mix the beans with the roux)



- Place andouille sausage in hot skillet and cook and flip until brown. Set aside.
- In same skillet, warmthe duck fat.
- Slowly add the Guidry's Creole seasoning until lightly brown.
- Add the garlic and stir until brown.
- Slowly sprinkle in the roux stirring continuously. CAUTION: This roux will brown fast, so work fast. Use enough roux by sprinkling (to prevent clumps) until just before a cake batter consistency and until caramel brown. Reduce the heat.
- Add the sausage and stir.
 Add the coriander, cumin and bouillon cubes. Stir and mix well.
- Once the bouillon is well mixed in, add the tomato paste.

FROM THE BAR

Some lives are so complex that their story is better suited for a book rather than a Spyglass article. That is the case with our next "From the Bar" interview. Seminarian, Vietnam vet, senior marine electrical engineer, automobile enthusiast, cancer and Agent Orange survivor all describe our next interviewee, Allen Normand.

Al was raised in Beaumont, TX, where he describes his early life as "wild" with details best left to future bar stories. His antics led to enrollment in a private high school, quickly followed by a discipline-related transfer to Saint Edward's Seminary and boarding school. The seminarians realized that his talents would be better applied elsewhere and soon encouraged a third transfer to Beaumont's French High School where Al graduated. After high school, Al studied geology at Lamar University, again in Beaumont. All went well until his inability to distinguish pastel colors forced him to drop a course, leaving him one credit shy of meeting the criteria for a full-time student. The draft board was alert, and Al found himself in the Army, undergoing placement tests.

Al scored very well in all the Army's tests and was encouraged to attend the Army Security Agency's (now NSA's) school for special operations. He soon found himself, well behind enemy lines, installing and maintaining equipment for encrypted communications between firebases throughout Vietnam's Central Highlands. Fighting mosquitoes as well as the enemy, Al was repeatedly sprayed with Agent Orange as helicopters cleared areas surrounding firebases. At the time, Agent Orange provided a welcome relief from the omnipresent Vietnamese bugs that also inhabited our firebases. Agent Orange exposure eventually led to a full medical disability, three cancer operations, four heart attacks and five stents. Our service personnel often pay a high price for time served.

Al's love of mechanics began when his father gave him his first car at age 12, and told him that if he worked hard on repairs, he would be able to drive it at age 15. Al also joined MouseCar's Garage as a parts cleaner, but soon graduated to engine assembly. Recognizing Al's incredible mechanical talent, the owner split labor income. As the equivalent of a master mechanic at one of the most respected shops in Beaumont, Al's income surpassed that of most adults, all before he had his driver's license. As an addicted automobile enthusiast, Al eventually owned, among many others, 4 Porsches, a Shelby Cobra, 4 Corvettes, a 1954 MG TD classic and a modified Austin Healy Sprite hotrod. Rae Ann, his wife and partner for 36 years, can sometimes be seen with Al in their hotrod drawing attention in the TYC parking lot.

One Corvette, modified to over 640 horsepower, deserves special mention. Al passed a Louisiana radar speed trap at 207 mph. The speeding ticket is framed in his office. You will need to ask Al how he avoided jail time.

We are fortunate to have AI and Rae Ann as TYC members. You might thank AI for his service to our country... and for driving the speed limit in the vicinity of Tammany Yacht Club. AI's service dog, Sadie, would also enjoy a pat for her service.

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
